# The Island of Djerba: A Living Heritage

## El Ghriba Synagogue

-  One of the oldest synagogues in the world, with origins traced back over 2,600 years

## Historical Significance



### Ancient Origins

Founded by Cohanim who fled Jerusalem after the destruction of the First Temple in 586 BCE



### Pilgrimage Site

Major destination during Lag Ba'Omer festival when thousands gather for celebrations



### Miraculous Light

Local tradition tells of a young woman whose death guided the community to build the synagogue





# Jewish Villages of Djerba

## Hara Kebira

**The Great Quarter** is the larger and more commercially active Jewish village.

# Tunis and the North: Urban Legacy

## The Great Synagogue of Tunis

- 📍 Located on Avenue de la Liberté
- 🏛️ Built in 1937 with Art Deco and North African elements
- 🏰 Grand facade and ornate interior
- 🕒 Symbol of the Jewish community's past prominence



## The Hara of Tunis

- 📍 Former Jewish quarter within the Tunis Medina
- 🏠 Narrow streets like Rue des Juifs
- 🏪 Home to Jewish merchants and artisans
- 📖 Self-contained neighborhood with rich traditions



## Borgel Cemetery

- 📍 Located in the northern part of Tunis
- 🏹 One of the largest Jewish cemeteries in North Africa
- Final resting place for rabbis, scholars, and community leaders
- ✝️ Diverse tombstones from simple markers to elaborate mausoleums

# Tunisian Jewish food and Crafts

## Distinctive Dishes

### Brik

A popular pastry filled with egg, tuna, harissa, and parsley, then deep-fried

### Couscous Variations

Unique preparations incorporating fish, vegetables, and specific spices

### Harissa חריס

A sweet, often fried pastry associated with Jewish holidays

### Fricassé

A savory fried sandwich filled with tuna, potatoes, olives, and harissa

## Traditional Crafts

### Silver Filigree Jewelry

Djerba is renowned for its intricate silver filigree jewelry, a craft historically practiced by Jewish artisans like khomsa and the special work of nemli.

### Textiles

Certain textile patterns and embroidery styles have been influenced by the community's presence over centuries

- ✓ Some sites may have specific photography rules

- ✓ Check visiting hours in advance
- ✓ Hours may vary around Shabbat and holidays
- ✓ Plan accordingly to maximize your visit

# Best Times to Visit

## Winter ( December to February )

- Ideal for exploring sites
- Perfect for cultural immersion experiences
- Lower tourist crowds compared to summer

## Spring ( March to May )

- Similar pleasant weather conditions
- Excellent for sightseeing across Tunisia
- Harvest season offers unique cultural experiences
- Lag ba'Omer pilgrimage every year ( May )
